

FROM THE PASTORS' DESK

We haven't gotten out our box of Christmas books yet, but there are a few that we leave on the shelf because we sometimes need them as we plan for Advent. The other day, I picked up *God is in the Manger: Reflections on Advent and Christmas.* In addition to the devotional that we get from church, there are other devotions that we like to browse through every year, and this book is my favorite. It features selected writings of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, and in my mind, no one says the message of Christmas better. Bonhoeffer is straightforward and simple without being trivial and simplistic. He's theological without being academic. He captures the mystery without being esoteric.

He writes: "God becomes human, really human. While we endeavor to grow out of our humanity, to leave our human nature behind us, God becomes human, and we must recognize that God wants us also to become human – really human. Whereas we distinguish between the godly and the godless, the good and the evil, the noble and the common, God loves real human beings without distinction" (p. 50).

I'm not sure the world has done a good job of being really human this past year. War in Gaza and Ukraine, political and social rhetoric that demonizes people as the enemy, and a failure to prioritize the poor, the hungry and the homeless. The time is right for Christmas, to refocus our efforts on being really human, on being Christ-like.

Advent reminds us that this is God's world, and no matter how discouraging or despairing we may be, God intends to enter it, to become really human. "This is about the birth of a child," writes Bonhoeffer, "not of the astonishing work of a strongman, not of the bold discovery of a wise man, not of the pious work of a saint. It really is beyond all our understanding: the birth of a child shall bring about the great change, shall bring to all salvation and deliverance" (p. 51).

Advent brings renewed hope, joy, peace, and love into our lives. It reminds us that we are not abandoned. I'm ready for that, ready for the joyful music, the focus on love, and the invitation to welcome the Christ-child, and the call to be "really human."

Advent begins the new church year with the gift from God that transforms us and our world. Something we can celebrate and at the same time something to challenge us: to receive the "really human" and to become "really human."

Send a Card or Note to an Imprisoned Parent

We hope to reach **each imprisoned parent with at least one communication**. It can be as simple as a Christmas card or as elaborate as a letter. Each one should mention that your church (or you personally) has delivered gifts to the prisoner's child or children on his/her behalf. This is an outreach which takes just minutes and a stamp. It can involve your whole family. Angel Tree has some recommendations.

- Call or email Nancy Husk (665-9004; driftseeker@gmail.com) for the prisoner's name, ID#, and address. We will not be publishing this list of confidential information, but here's a specific way to address their mail.
- Do not use your last name to sign or in a return address.
- Use the church's address as the return address (1515 Helen 49002).
- Be aware that your communication will likely be opened and read by prison officials. *Claiming Hope through our gifts and our words*

Where? At church in the Narthex


What? Christmas treats, fellowship, fun, and surprises

CONVERSATIONS ABOUT REPARATIONS

A number of Westminster members, along with folks from other area churches, had the opportunity this fall to hear a presentation about reparations for African-Americans, from speakers representing the Justice League of Greater Lansing. The attendees were moved by what they learned, and want to learn more.

The idea of reparations is new to many, and raises questions for others. Questions like "Wasn't slavery over a long time ago?" "Why is this needed?" "How can it possibly happen?" Reparations is about more than slavery; a long history of unequal treatment extending right to the present day has led to a host of inequities. This was never random or accidental, but the result of policies enacted by governments and other institutions. Those wrongs can never be righted but are there ways to make amends and address the inequities? It's a difficult question and a huge issue, that begs for greater understanding.

Some Westminster folks are taking part in conversations with members of First Presbyterian, Kalamazoo and other churches about the possibility of forming a reparations organization similar to the Justice League in our community. They also feel it's important for <u>us</u> to have conversation about this within our church. **Watch for information and an invitation to one of several small group opportunities** this winter to discuss, ask questions, and hear about the very interesting approach the Justice League of Greater Lansing is taking.
